Iringa Tanzania Journey

12 Ambassadors are packing our gear and getting the details taken care of for our upcoming Journey to FF Iringa, Tanzania, with add-on safari trips.

One of FF Iringa's projects is to support a couple of the local schools in the area. Few children get a chance to finish high school. Our ambassadors will be giving one of the schools two scholarships. We will also be giving other school supplies.

I have been working with Tito Kilale, the President of FF Iringa. Tito is also one of the founders of Mt Calvary Open School. This school covers our grades 7-10 (approximately). Mount Calvary Open School in Mtitu village is indeed a beacon of hope for many students facing obstacles to accessing education. The school is becoming a vital institution in the community, apart from offering academic education, it also is planning to offer life skills and livelihood training.

By embracing open schooling, Mount Calvary Open School caters to the needs of learners who may not thrive in traditional educational settings due to various challenges such as distance, family responsibilities, or financial constraints. Its emphasis on self-directed learning and personalized pace enables students to take ownership of their education journey, ultimately fostering a sense of empowerment and agency.

We are exploring ideas for connecting Sacramento school(s) with Mt Calvary School – via email, zoom, pen-pal or whatever. Possible collaboration projects? It would give each class insights into life in another world, and appreciation for the difficulties each student is facing. If you have some ideas for schools we might connect with, let me know – either now (before our trip) or after we get back (June).

CURIOUS HOW YOU CAN PAY FOR YOUR MEMBERSHIP FEES, EVENT, JOURNEY-RELATED EXPENSES, ETC. ????

Just a little background info for you:

Our club has two treasurers who are elected each calendar year. We have a journey treasurer, who is Dan Ortiz. Dan is responsible for all journey income and expenses, in-bound and out-bound. If you are participating in a journey event e.g. a welcome or farewell party, you need to be reimbursed for journey expenses e.g. decorations for a party, or you are going on a journey and need to pay (FFI fees go directly to FFI via their website, not to Dan), Dan or your journey coordinator is your contact.

I (Charlene Taylor) am the general Treasurer this year. I am responsible for all non-journey-related income and expenses e.g. membership (dues) fees, non-journey-related events e.g. the holiday party, craft sales (Julia Smith normally collects for crafts and sends the \$ to me for deposit), operating expenses such as our zoom bill, tax and license fees etc. You may pay in many ways e.g. PayPal via our website when you have registered for an update, by check or, we even take cash!

Memorial Day

Memorial Day was first celebrated in 1868 to honor both Union and Confederate soldiers who died in battle or died after injuries sustained in battle during the Civil War. It was initially known as Decoration Day as friends and family members visited cemeteries and decorated the graves with American flags, flowers, and mementos. In addition to the national observance, it also established the first national cemeteries for burial and memorial services to veterans. Today, there are 155 national cemeteries in 42 states. Many cities hold annual parades and ceremonies and participate in the national moment of remembrance at 3 pm local time. During World War II (WWII), Decoration Day was renamed Memorial Day. In 1971, it became a National Holiday on the last Monday of May as the official day of remembrance.

According to the Department of Defense, the American Civil War ranks number 1 by the total of U.S. military deaths at 655,000 (estimate for both Union and Confederate soldiers). It is followed by World War II (WW), at 405,399 military deaths and WWI at 116, 516. The Vietnam War ranks 4 th at 58,209 casualties, followed by the Korean War at 34,574, and American Revolutionary War at 25,000. The Iraq War had (2003-2011) had 4,476 and War in Afghanistan at 2,432 (2001-2021) casualties, respectively.

Please note that it is impolite to say "Happy Memorial Day" because for many families it is a day to mourn the grandparent, parent, spouse, child or friend that died in the service of our country. Instead, according to the Code of Support Foundation, the proper thing to say is:

- I wish you a meaningful Memorial Day.
- I hope you enjoy your weekend and pause to remember its purpose.
- Help remember those who served in our military on this Memorial Day.



Warren K Lee – Awarded Congressional Gold Medal

On March 9, 2024, Warren K. Lee, the father of Sandee Lee (Friendship Force Sacramento member), was awarded posthumously the Congressional Gold Medal, for his dedicated military service during WWII. This is the highest military award in the United States awarded by Congress. It was awarded to Warren Lee for his bravery, valor, and patriotism in defending and protecting democracy at home and overseas.

The majority of Chinese Americans serving in the armed forces were in nonsegregated units. However, Warren served in the segregated unit of the 14 th Air

Service Group in the China, Burma, India theater. By having segregated units, the U.S. Army thought the Chinese American soldiers could work and fight cooperatively with the Chinese Nationalist allies under Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek. As many as 15,000 Chinese Americans enlisted in the U.S. military, representing about 20 percent of the Chinese American male population in the United States. Warren's two brothers also served in the military. An estimated 40 percent of the troops of Chinese ancestry were not native-born citizens nor could they obtain citizenship due to the Chinese Exclusion Act. Soong Mei-Ling, wife of Chiang Kai-shek, advised the US government to repeal the Chinese Exclusion Act



to boost Chinese American morale and increase the number of enlistments in the armed forces. This act was repealed in 1943 by Congress and many soldiers were able to become naturalized citizens. Thereafter, many Chinese American servicemen were also able to bring their wives home to the United States from China.

These Chinese American troops, in partnering with the Chinese National allies, were instrumental in defeating the Imperial Army of Japan in China. As a soldier, Warren was able to witness the surrender of the Japanese to the Chinese Nationalists in Nanjing, China, on September 9, 1945. After the war, Warren married Sandee's Mom Hope Chinn, and owned and operated a grocery store in southeast Bakersfield for many years until his retirement.

We learned about the core Sikh beliefs which are:

- 1. One God;
- 2. All are equal in the eyes of God;
- 3. Earning an honest living;
- 4. Share with others (time, money, etc);
- 5. Remember God throughout one's day;
- 6. Sikhs do not believe in fasting, superstitions, ritualism, caste system;
- 7. Sikhism prohibits smoking, drinking alcohol or taking any intoxicants.

They have the 5 "K"s (Kara or iron bracelet to remind them to do good deeds; Kesh: uncut hair (both men and women); Kirpan (sword or dagger for protection); Kanga (comb) for cleanliness; and Kachera (long underpants for self discipline.
